A Message from our Pastor





Always be ready to make your defense to anyone who demands from you an accounting for the hope that is in you; yet do it with gentleness and reverence. 1 Peter 3:15-16 (NRSV)

This text from First Peter is often mentioned in connection with doing what sometimes is called "giving your testimony." While our Reformed/Presbyterian tradition—at least in contemporary times—has not provided many formal opportunities for members to give their testimonies, it can be a very powerful practice. When Christians speak publicly about why they feel blessed to be followers of, and believers in, Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior, it has a power to persuade those who have not yet come to a saving faith in Jesus. Such testimonies also greatly encourage other Christians in their lives of faith. No one escapes ups and downs in our faith. Hearing another Christian describe their challenges and their victories is a great inspiration, for we say, "If God has helped them in that powerful way, then God can help me, too."

Since we recommenced our Wednesday night programs, we have had two members of this congregation bring us talks that, essentially, have been their testimonies. Both of them were about addictions and the power that they can wield over our lives. Both, with God's help, have had significant victories over these addictions. Through these talks we have learned that addiction—no matter what the substance or behavior one is addicted to—have certain things in common. Similarly, the spiritual and practical tools we have against the addictions in some sense are also the same. So, since we all probably experience some kind of addictive behavior, or are affected by a loved one who does, these talks have helped us to be on guard and to know more about the dynamics of addiction.

Tonight's program will be presented by Jonathan Edwards, who is the executive director of Serving You Ministries, an organization that is performing important ministry in the Woodlawn area of Birmingham and beyond. I think you'll appreciate his energy and vision.

We have your great suggestions for other speakers in the future and are in the process of trying to arrange those. SO please consider, if you are not already, coming to the dinners on Wednesday and staying for the programs. (By the way, the kids are really enjoying their own programs, which are being led by our Christian Education director, Spencer Bissell. So far Spencer has been using science "experiments" to illustrate theological ideas to the kids.)

I'll look forward to seeing you there!

Then go to Sign Up or Login at the right top of the page. Then you register or login. If you have not registered as a volunteer before, click on Sign up and register as a volunteer. Habitat will want your name and contact information. You will need to agree to Habitat's waiver of liability.

Once you are registered as a volunteer, then go to Login. Login sends you to your My Participation page, then click on the 2019 Presbytery & Parham Family site. This will send you to the calendar for the Presbytery & Parham Family build site. Pick the date you want to volunteer, which is November 2.

God Calls Us Together



The Presbytery of Sheppards and Lapsley held its regular stated meeting on Thursday, August 15, 2019 at Grace Presbyterian Church in Tuscaloosa, AL. We enjoyed wonderful hospitality all day from the staff and members of Grace and we are deeply grateful!

Moderator Susan Clayton opened the meeting with prayer. Stated Clerk Tom Winter declared that a quorum was present and presbytery adopted the docket for the day. The presbytery welcomed visitors, corresponding members and first time commissioners to the meeting.

The gathered community then joined together in worship which included wonderful musical offerings by the Choir of Grace Presbyterian Church, as well as a sermon by Grace Pastor, Rev. Cathy Hoop. Her sermon was entitled "When the South Wind Blows" and was based on the Scripture passage Luke 12:49-56. The Offering was taken and the proceeds were given 50% to the Commission on Preparation for Ministry for candidates, and the other 50% to the Presbytery's discretionary fund for pastoral care. The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was celebrated by Olympia McCrackin and Cathy Hoop, and the congregation received the elements by intinction.

UA Crossroads Workshop

After worship, the presbytery broke up into two groups to participate in a workshop led by UA Crossroads and hosted by the presbytery's Anti-Racism Team. This workshop of an hour-and-a-half helped us examine our stereotypes and biases around many issues that divide us as human beings: race, ethnicity, religious affiliation, political affiliation, gender, gender identity, sexual orientation, language, ability/disability, immigration status and other areas of human difference. Both groups found this workshop illuminating and challenging as we continue the work of facing racism in our presbytery this year.

A delicious lunch prepared by members of Grace Presbyterian Church followed the workshop and nourished us for the remainder of our afternoon's business. The business meeting of presbytery reconvened at 1:30PM with Good News shared by the Presbyterian Home for Children and several of our member churches. There is much wonderful ministry happening in our presbytery!

Presbytery Business



The Executive Council report by Jane Clayton contained only one item of action. Council recommended that Dr. Jay Wilkins, General Presbyter, be honorably retired as of December 31, 2019. Jay made some comments about this next phase in his life and expressed his deep love for the presbytery, his gratitude for the years of service together, and his hope for the faithful future of our presbytery. Jay will remain in the area and have more time to enjoy his family, particularly his grandchildren—there is a new

grandchild on the way! Reluctantly, presbytery approved Jay's retirement and thanked him with a standing ovation.

Ministry Within our Presbytery

Some highlights of the presbytery meeting include:

Jonathan Yarboro and Jenny Thagard gave a report for Living River. The summer camping season was a great success at Living River with leaders and participants in all camping experiences reporting a wonderful experience of faith-building on the banks of the Cahaba. The Board of Directors of Living River continues to work on paying off the debt, but has also taken action to meet the reduced income of the camp by laying off all Cahaba Education Center staff, the Food Service Manager, and Jenny Thagard, the Director, has moved to part-time. Much work lies ahead for the presbytery and the Living River Board in trying to get the camp on solid financial footing in 2020. We ask for prayers for the staff, board members and our presbytery as we seek to discern God's will for the future of Living River.



Mark McCormick gave a good report from Stillman College, which greeted its highest number of incoming first year students in many years.

Many good things are happening at Stillman. The school continues to need the presbytery's prayers and support.



The Commission on Ministry four ministers for examination to be received into the presbytery. It was a very international group of clergy as we welcomed Rev. Jungkyun Son as Associate Pastor at Korean, Auburn-Opelika; Rev. Daekeun Park as Associate at Korean, Auburn-Opelika; Rev. Young Kim to Anniston-Korean and Rev. Sunelle Stander from the

Dutch Reformed Church in South Africa to serve as a Chaplain at UAB Hospital. All four examinations were sustained and all four candidates were warmly welcomed into membership in the Presbytery of Sheppards and Lapsley. We pray their ministries will be fruitful and joyful and look forward to their gifts adding to our life together as a presbytery.

Ralls Coston made a report as our Mission Coordinator about the good mission work happening around our presbytery. Of particular interest at the moment is the Habitat for Humanity House that the Birmingham churches will join together to build beginning on September 19.

Patti Winter made the report from the Nominating Committee. Presbytery voted to approve Emily Burt, Young Adult from First Presbyterian Church, Birmingham to the Youth Council, Class of 2020; and George Fritsma to serve an unexpired term on the Presbyterian Home for Children Board of Directors.



Keenan Rogers from the Presbyterian Board of Pensions made a report about some changes and invited us to download an app that would help track our health as part of the BOP.

Belinda Dickinson reported for the Congo Team that there would be a Congo Network meeting in Knoxville in October. She also reported on funds donated so far in memory of Jerry Vandegrift.



Rush Watson reported on behalf of the Presbytery Trustees. Presbytery approved a motion recommending the sale of the former Trinity Presbyterian Church property to The Vine Church of Birmingham. Sale price is \$630,000 with a cash down payment at closing of \$126,000. Closing to be no later than August 26, 2019.

Neil McCarter reported for Equip, Nurture, Connect about upcoming events: the Youth Council retreat on October 12-13 at Living River, the Children's Retreat on January 3-4 at Living River, and the Main Event in February 2020.

The meeting adjourned with prayer.

The qualt is a powerful snapshot of the struggle for racial equality in Alabama.

Septemeber Session Summary

The regular meeting of the session of Mountain Brook Presbyterian Church was called to order by the moderator, Rev. Lant Davis, on Sunday, September 8, 2019, at 5:00 in the church library with all members in attendance. The opening devotional and prayer were given by Norton Montague.

The agenda was accepted with the addition to the clerk's report of discussion of procedures for the selection of the Pastor Nominating Committee.

Elder responsibilities for devotional and prayer, home communion, and presbytery meeting were reviewed. For the October meeting, Karen Ogle will have the devotional.

Erskine Carmichael reported briefly on the presbytery meeting at Grace Church in Tuscaloosa on August 15, 2019.

On motion duly made and passed, the session voted to have the congregational Nominating Committee solicit nominations for the Pastor Nominating Committee from the congregation and to form a slate from the nominations. Nominations will also be accepted from the floor in a congregational meeting.

After receiving approval from the executive presbyter and the chairman of the committee on ministry of the presbytery, the session agreed by electronic vote that a meeting of the congregation would be called and publicized by Rev. Lant Davis for September, 29, 2019, immediately after worship. The purpose of the meeting will be to elect the Pastor Nominating Committee.

Ministry Team Reports Stewardship Committee

Rev. Davis reported that the stewardship campaign will begin on September 22, 2019, and will end on October 13, 2019, pledge Sunday. The theme will be "Devoted to Generosity" and materials from the Ecumenical Stewardship Center, resource for the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), will be used.

Personnel Committee

Rev. Davis has subscribed to an online data base maintained by "Church Law and Tax" which will provide helpful information in reviewing our current compensation levels in preparation of the budget for calendar year 2020.

Education Committee

The schedule and plans for Wednesday night activities were presented.

Property Committee

On the recommendation of the Property Committee and on motion duly passed, the session voted to change our HVAC maintenance contract from Robert Puckett Central Heating and Air to Hardy Services, Inc., the base price of which is \$4614.00 annually.

Before the session meeting, the Property Committee recommended that the session authorize Servpro of Birmingham to remediate the mold in the St. Stephen Building for the proposed price of \$2916.00. By subsequent electronic vote, the session accepted this recommendation and authorized payment from the Major Capital Repairs Fund. Work will begin on September 10, 2019.

Carpenter Matt Smith, with help from Dave Kaiser, Spencer Bissell, and Alex Wellman, repaired the front doors of the church on September 7, 2019.

Alan Speaker will research details concerning a possible grant from FEMA that would cover new protection for the stained glass windows as well as upgrades in security within the church buildings after an initial payment of \$6000.00 by Mountain Brook Presbyterian Church for a comprehensive review of both projects.

Worship Committee

The Lord's Supper was served in Sunday worship on September 1, 2019. Extended communion was served on September 4.

Helen Faught and Sue Wellman have agreed to co-chair the Worship Committee.

Mission and Outreach

The MBPC date for working on the Habitat for Humanity house in Center Point has been set for November 1, 2019. The committee recommended that MBPC participate in a clothing drive specific to men's underwear and socks to benefit the Church of the Reconciler in downtown Birmingham. The motion passed.

Preschool Committee

The amount over the preschool's reserve fund of \$10,000.00 for the academic year 2018-2019 that will be transferred to the church (Outside Budget, account #1-4219) is \$4861.82.

Moderator's Report

Rev. Davis will be out of town from October 14, 2019-October 27, 2019.
